I am writing to encourage you to vote against the proposed ordinance which seems at first glance to save Tinker Field, but is written so that the field can be demolished. This field is a vital part of Orlando's history and the history of the nation. There are alternatives to what the Mayor and Commissioner Stuart are planning, and it is time the community's wishes and concerns were genuinely considered. The deliberately deceiving ordinance might make the public first think the City wants to save the historic site, but in reality it is nothing more than a cleverly worded way to destroy the historic site right after Black History Month ends. This is a bait and switch written to obfuscate and confuse the careless reader. It is meant to quiet opposition with false promises. We have seen this recently in the fight for College Park's island gateway, and this is the same game with the same major players on the council.

I urge all of the City Council members to vote against this ordinance as proposed. Alternatives to demolishing the grandstands and field have been suggested and deserve genuine consideration. I hope Commissioner Hill will have the courage to stand for her community and lead a majority of the council members in voting against this proposal as written. It will not be easy or popular, but I hope and pray she gathers the strength.

Hi Robert,

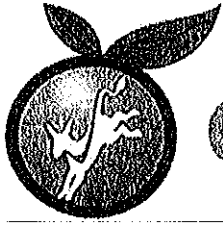

RESOLUTION RELATING TO THE PRESERVATION OF TINKER FIELD

WHEREAS, Tinker Field, controlled for a century by the City of Orlando, occupies approximately 3 acres of the 7-acre Tinker Field baseball complex, which in turn is part of the Citrus Bowl or Orlando Sports Arena Complex; and

WHEREAS, the boundaries of the property encompass the historic playing field (including the diamond, infield and outfield, as well as the surface grass from 1914) and the renovated Stadium of 1963-1964; and

WHEREAS, the Stadium contains over 1000 seats relocated during the 1963-64 renovation by the legendary Cal Griffiths from his Washington Stadium; and

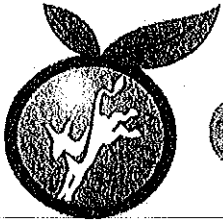
WHEREAS, the Stadium was again renovated as recently as 1990 after the construction of the now-demolished Amway Arena; and

WHEREAS, Tinker Field was created and named after beloved Orlando resident Joe Tinker, a Major League Baseball Hall of Fame player who was a member of the Chicago Cubs dynasty between 1906 and 1910; and was first used to play baseball in 1914; and

WHEREAS, the first known stadium was built on the site in 1923 and hosted many baseball greats like Babe Ruth, Jackie Robinson, Lou Gehrig, and Hank Aaron; and

WHEREAS, one of the most historic events to take place at Tinker Field was a visit by Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. in 1964, on his only visit to Orlando, when he spoke from the pitcher's mound to a racially mixed audience of thousands seated together in the very grandstand, which is still in place in the current stadium; and

WHEREAS, On May 14, 2004, Tinker Field was added to the U. S. National Register of Historic Places;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Orange County Democratic Executive Committee calls upon Mayor Dyer and the City Council of Orlando to direct staff to more thoroughly research the potential uses for the field and the historic grandstand; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Orange County Democratic Executive Committee calls upon the City of Orlando to take whatever steps may be necessary to ensure that the original venue is preserved and recognized for its intrinsic value to the sports, civil rights, and cultural history of Orlando; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Orange County Democratic Executive Committee calls upon the City of Orlando, Orange County and any other interested parties, both public and private, to develop a plan for the preservation and use of the facility.

New Research on Tinker Field and Orlando Civil Rights History

Dear Commissioner Stuart,

Earlier today I delivered to your office a hard copy of new research our foundation has produced on Tinker Field and Orlando's Civil Rights history. I hope that this research will be a useful tool to you in promoting the best decisions for the City and the community regarding the historic and cultural asset of Tinker Field. I wanted to offer a PDF copy as well which you can download via Wetransfer by clicking this link. I will also send the file as an attachment separately.

Much of the information we have compiled is largely unknown and has even surprised some of Orlando's civil rights pioneers.

For example, not only is Dr. King's visit to Tinker Field well documented by five print articles in local media, and not only did Jackie Robinson play at Tinker in 1953 drawing the largest overflow crowd in Tinker Field history (surpassing Babe Ruth's attendance record in 1927), but Tinker Field hosted a pivotal Negro Leagues game on April 5, 1939 with seven future Hall of Famers including the legendary Josh Gibson. This particular game was catalytic in propelling the idea of integration in professional baseball to a national level, eight years before Jackie Robinson broke the color barrier in Brooklyn. Also, Tinker Field hosted Orlando's first integrated event when Ray Dandridge took the field on March 31, 1950, which set our course for developing a culture of equality and fairness that we so value today.

In short, the findings show that Tinker Field's significance to baseball history is unique not only to the region but to the nation which creates a significant opportunity for the City of Orlando. And even more compelling, the research shows that Tinker Field's significance to Orlando's Civil Rights Movement is remarkable and unparalleled.

We appreciate your leadership in navigating a sea of conflicting viewpoints on the subject. We will continue to remain involved and want to be of help however we can.

Commissioner Sheehan,

This new ordinance about Tinker Field is ridiculous. The baseball diamond alone is not a historic landmark. It's the entire stadium (including the grandstands) that is a landmark. When the negro baseball league played baseball there, the stadium included the grandstands. When Dr. King spoke there, he spoke to the people in the grandstands. Why would we only preserve part of the stadium?

The Historic Preservation Board recommended the entire stadium be designated as historic. The Venues staff recommends that only the diamond be designated a historic landmark. If we are making decisions about whether or not something is a historic landmark and requires preservation, it makes much more sense to listen to the Historic Preservation Board than the Venues staff.

According to the City's own analysis, it will cost \$10 million to renovate the entire stadium. That seems like a small price compared to every other venue that has been built or renovated. Would we really tear down a piece of history to save \$10 million? That's a piece of history that can never be recreated.

I have heard many in the community express an interest in saving Tinker Field in its entirety. Yet, I have heard very few people who think we should tear it down.

I hope that the ordinance can be amended to save all of Tinker Field, including the grandstands.

Thank you for your commitment to historic preservation.

I just wanted to send you a quick email to follow up on your remarks at Council today, where you improperly referenced my name with false information. I wanted to take a minute to be very clear, you may have been mistaken but I was nodding my head during your comments about Major League Baseball because I agreed with you, and I disagree with others who are proposing building a Major (as you said) or Minor league baseball stadium. I know the costs of a true minor league stadium, and I'm familiar with the size needed.

I have always contended Little League, charity matches, softball and a public park were options I supported, and options I included in my proposal which was submitted to other Commissioners and the County. I'm sure you are familiar with what I proposed.

Good Morning.....I am so hoping we can get this issue on the right playing field today.....

NONE of the changes that were promised to us from the meeting on March 5th, that they in turn promised us would be changed when I mentioned the changes hadn't been done that was a reason for the Council on March 9th to vote against this ordinance until the language was perfected,

The Mayor, the Venues and the City attorney all said these changes would be put in don't worry we vote all the time on the first reading and the words change.....**THAT THEY DID FOR THE WORSE FOR TINKER FIELD.....**Clarification of Utilities, definition of temporary uses and what is considered temporary.....none of these were done in the ordinance, I must be fair the word Memorial was changed to Commemoration.

Commissioner Sheehan had asked that the exemption for cemmemoration be removed that was done in Section1.

There were only 4 sections before, now there are 5 sections.....there is a new Section 2 and the others were renumbered.....Section 2.....**GIVES ALL AUTHORITY TO THE DIRECTOR OF VENUES** or his designee.....to make a plan for commemoration of Tinker Field.....he is directed to get advise from Wells Built and a local recognized historian and with Commissioner Hill to take public input.....but all in all Venues is in control per the ordinance.....no reading between the lines there.

So in giving Commissioner Sheehan her request, now the Venues Department decides on what is presented and not presented to the Historic Preservation Board for their approval.....**SLAP.**

We talked about a PLAN but the PLAN was to bring baseball back to Tinker Field, not to bury it under parked cars with tombstones around the property.....

DON'T BE FOOLED.....the Mayor and the Venues Department are getting just what they planned when the Citrus Bowl Renovations were still on the drawing boards.

We are asking all of the Commissioners to vote NO on the ordinance today and send it back for public input, and definitions vs being **TOTALLY** in control by the Mayor and Venues Department.

Emmett, thanks for your comments and your interest. However, as a reminder, based upon my personal experience with youth baseball for 46 years and the direct correspondence with representatives of Major League Baseball, you cannot play baseball on the existing Tinker Field with it's current configuration. So, let me be clear by posing a couple of questions that will help formulate my decision...

1. If the existing stadium is refurbished, can you play baseball on the existing field? No.
2. If refurbished, can you play Little League baseball (60' diamond) on the existing field? Yes, but the field will have to be modified.
3. If the field is modified, will it represent that original configuration of Tinker Field? No, the modifications must be made for any baseball (60' diamond) to be played keeping the existing Home Plate at it's current location.
4. What is the cost to renovate the existing stands to bring them up to code? Currently estimated at about \$10,000,000.
5. If the stands were removed, can you play baseball on the existing Tinker Field? Yes (see question #2 for description of modifications required prior to playing baseball)
6. If the field is modified for Little League play, can you place historical markers within the field? No, this is a violation of the existing Little League rules to allow obstructions within the field of play.

So, the existing Tinker Field can not be used in it's current condition and can not be modified in such a way as to commemorate activity that occurred on the field (allowing play). The cost of the renovations are \$10,000,000 of which would come out of existing general revenue funds (as the CRA does NOT encompass this property. And, an ordinance to create a larger, designated park as Tinker Field will allow the city to commemorate the important activities that occurred there.

So, in response, I see this as a protection to the park. I also understand that there will never be Major League baseball, in the current configuration, played on that park. But, if a team or developer can pull it off in the future, this area is designated for such an activity.

Emmett, as a reminder...making any change to the existing field is contrary to the general discussion of the designation of the field. That's what I've been saying for a year. If you're going to take the field, then let's look at a plan. The latest recommended changes of the ordinance provide plenty of protection of the field and enough time to attempt to secure funding (of which we don't have currently). While you say that you don't support using the existing stands, many of your followers do. And, there are several who know we can't use the field for baseball that have been telling everyone we can...it's infuriating.
